The Advent Wreath



Each season in the liturgical calendar comes with its own local and regional rituals.

During the Advent season, wreathes adorn church sanctuaries and family dining room tables. You may have said Advent wreath prayers in childhood or taken a turn lighting the candles.

The Advent wreath is full of symbolism about Christ and His coming at Christmas. The wreath is made of evergreen boughs, reminding us that the life of grace doesn't falter with the changing seasons. It always remains fresh and new. Similarly, a circular wreath reminds us of the eternal, never-ending nature of God's love.

Candles remind us that Christ is the light of the world, the One who "shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." Candles and vestments are purple throughout Advent to remind us that while we wait in hopeful stillness, we also wait in joyful hope for the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. As the candles are lighted in order, the wreath is also a spiritual countdown for our celebration of the first coming of Jesus at Christmas.

On the third Sunday of Advent, we light a rose candle. The priest will wear rose vestments at Mass. This is Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means "rejoice" in Latin.

Whatever the color and whatever the day, the Advent wreath is a beautiful practice to focus our attention on Christ's coming at Christmas and our waiting in joyful hope for the coming of our Lord.

Reflections on Readings for the First Sunday of Advent

"At An Hour You Do Not Expect, The Son Of Man Will Come'

This First Sunday of Advent is the beginning of our new liturgical year (Year A). Most of our Gospel readings through-out the year are taken from the Gospel of Matthew.



The word "Advent" is taken from the Latin word Adventus, meaning "to come" or "arrival". In the Roman usage, the word meant the glorious entry of an emperor to his capital city. This is a season of preparation and anticipation for the glorious entry of our savior into our world and our lives. In order to prepare our hearts to receive Christ as new again, the Church brings our attention to two comings of Christ. We contemplate, through scripture, Jesus' "arrival" as the Christ child and also His second coming at the tinal judgement.

In our first reading (Isaiah 2:1-5), Isaiah prophesies about the end times when Jerusalem would be restored to its full glory and that the covenant promise made by God to Abraham would be fulfilled. All nations will "climb the Lord's mountain . . . that he may instruct us in his ways". No longer will nations be at war with one another. The Lord will be the judge of all nations.

Our Epistle reading (Romans 13:11-14): During the time of St. Paul, it was thought that Christ's return wound be sooner rather than later. St. Paul instructs his readers how to live in anticipation of Christ's coming, throwing off "the works of darkness" and putting on Christ.

In our Gospel reading (Matthew 24: 37-44), Jesus prepared His followers for "the coming of the Son of Man" at the final judgment and admonished them to be alert and watchful. "So too, you also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come."

Our scripture readings today help us look to the future, when Christ will come in judgement and mercy. They also help us focus on how we are to live in the present, walking "in the light of the Lord." The early Christians thought Christ's coming was imminent. While it has been two thousand years of anticipation, that day and hour could be a thousand years from now or tomorrow. The time and hour is not as important as the life we live in anticipation, in assurance and joy of what is to come. That is what the Advent season is about.

Rochester Hope

Reflections on a Saturday Morning at Rochester Hope



Sharing food with the hungry is part of the fabric of Christian life and a deep-seated part of the culture of St. Rita Parish. God commands it, Jesus gave us spectacular examples of it, and even declared that our willingness to do it on His behalf is one of the pillars of our final judgement. Our need to nourish our bodies is one of the strongest common denominators linking us as human beings, indeed, as part of creation.

So, it was natural for me, when I heard of a need for "shopping aides" at Rochester Hope's Food Pantry, to go down for a Saturday shift and lend a hand. Over 300 individuals come there every Saturday, waiting in long lines, seeking help in feeding their families; the need is great! There they are treated with the utmost human dignity and respect – the underlying principle of Rochester Hope.





In the 3 ½ hours I was there, I accompanied 16 to 18 persons, one by one, through the pantry, pushing a shopping cart, helping them select and bag basic food items, and then helping them unload the cart onto a pallet outdoors where they bundled their bags to take them home. The pantry was crowded with many other pairs doing the same, in a slow, methodical, well-organized pattern, while other volunteers hustled in and out re-stocking shelves.

What deeply touched me in a way I can't really articulate was the variety I encountered in both the clients and volunteers – people of every size, shape, age, and skin color, some dressed up, some disheveled, people of multiple languages and cultures, a true mosaic of the "image and likeness of God" in which we are made. When I looked into their eyes and greeted them by name, I could glimpse the face of Christ. The next day at Mass, it dawned on me: this, then, is the Kingdom of God – standing together in companionship with God's people, celebrating our common humanity. What a graced experience!

I went back for more the next month.


